

Simple Past – Past Continuous

Form

Simple Past	Past Progressive
<p>irregular verbs: see 2nd column of irregular verbs</p> <p>I spoke</p> <p>regular verbs: verb + ed</p> <p>I worked</p>	<p>past form of 'be' + ing form of verb</p> <p>I was speaking</p> <p>you were speaking</p> <p>he / she / it was speaking</p> <p>we were speaking</p> <p>they were speaking</p>
Exceptions	
<p>Exceptions when adding 'ed' :</p> <p>when the final letter is <i>e</i>, only add <i>d</i>.</p> <p>Example: love - loved</p> <p>after a short, stressed vowel, the final consonant is doubled</p> <p>Example: admit - admitted</p> <p>final <i>l</i> is always doubled in British English (not in American English)</p> <p>Example: travel - travelled</p> <p>after a consonant, final <i>y</i> becomes <i>i</i>. (but: not after a vowel)</p> <p>Example: worry - he worried</p> <p>but: play - he played</p>	<p>Exceptions when adding 'ing' :</p> <p>silent <i>e</i> is dropped (but: does not apply for <i>-ee</i>)</p> <p>Example: come - coming</p> <p>but: agree - agreeing</p> <p>after a short, stressed vowel, the final consonant is doubled</p> <p>Example: sit - sitting</p> <p>final <i>l</i> is always doubled in British English (not in American English)</p> <p>Example: travel - travelling</p> <p>final <i>ie</i> becomes <i>y</i>.</p> <p>Example: lie - lying</p>
